WILD BIRD CONSERVATION FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

Le Nichoir has embarked on what is the most important project in the history of avian conservation in Canada.

The construction of the new **Wild Bird Conservation Centre**, on land donated by the Nature Conservancy of Canada, will allow more educational and research activities, with 4-season rehabilitation space.

The new Centre will be equipped with care and research units and a classroom to accommodate children and visitors. It will improve year-round activities and allow for a new revenue stream from educational and youth programs activities, as well as organized bird watching tours. In the reception area, a Green Shop will display Canadian wildlife art and environmentally-friendly treats for visitors to purchase.

Le Nichoir is seeking financial support of \$1.2M to realize this important project in the Hudson – Vaudreuil-Soulanges region by 2011. These funds will be used for construction, facilities and equipment. A portion of the funds raised will be used to create a Nichoir Endowment for the long-term maintenance of the new Wild Bird Conservation Centre.

A UNIQUE CONSERVATION STORY

Le Nichoir's activities started in 1988 when a group of volunteers began to care for sick, injured and orphaned wild birds in their homes. Demand grew and volunteers decided to expand their operations by renting a 175-year old barn located in Hudson, Quebec (1994). The un-winterized barn offers limited space.

Today, Le Nichoir is a well-known non-profit organization and a reliable resource, providing educational activities, research opportunities and an excellent rehabilitation success rate. The Centre is also part of an international network of prominent conservation organizations, including the International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council (IWRC) and the National Wildlife Rehabilitators Association (NWRA).

OUR MISSION

Le Nichoir's mission is to conserve wild birds as a part of our natural heritage for future generations. Le Nichoir is committed to increasing awareness with respect to the protection of wild birds and, by taking positive action, acknowledges the important relationship between healthy ecosystems and human well-being.

Le Nichoir is a Canadian registered non-profit conservation organization that uses science-based methods to protect wild birds.

EDUCATION, REHABILITATION AND RESEARCH

EDUCATION ...

The Centre provides advice and information about wild bird conservation through educational programs, public events, and publications, which are all free of charge. More than 5,000 telephone calls and 1,000 e-mails are answered annually. Le Nichoir's website is a great resource for information and help.

"Birds in our Backyard" is an interactive program delivered in schools which helps children understand the importance of wild bird conservation and how to recognize bird species. Le Nichoir also has a Junior Volunteer Program which gives youngsters the opportunity to learn about nature and team work.

REHABILITATION ...

Each year the Centre provides care for hundreds of injured, sick or orphaned wild birds and waterfowl with the goal of releasing them back into their natural environment. We alleviate their pain, treat their injuries and illnesses, provide food, water, warmth, and a safe place where they can recuperate.

During the summertime, the Centre takes care of approximately 1,200 birds. The staff feeds hungry beaks every 15 minutes, 12 hours a day; volunteers clean cages continuously. Once they are strong enough to fly and feed on their own, birds are released back into their natural environment where they can join others of their species. In the fall, the Centre receives many birds with migration injuries; several birds spend the winter at the Centre.

RESEARCH ...

Le Nichoir offers hands-on experience for intern students registered in Vanier College's Ecological Technology and Veterinary Programs; an internship program for students at the Bachelor's level who will pursue a professional career in wildlife management is being developed.

The Centre works with scientists and researchers from the Canadian Wildlife Services (Environment Canada), McGill University, Université du Québec à Montréal and the Montreal Biodome.

Le Nichoir participates in bird banding programs with Canada and the United States and collaborates with scientists who study avian nutrition and rehabilitation.

Le Nichoir staff attend the annual IWRC Conference to continue improving their technical skills. The Centre also offers precious hands-on learning to students who are studying wildlife biology, veterinary technique or veterinary medicine.
